The Department of Pathology and Molecular Medicine in the Queen's University Faculty of Health Sciences and its affiliated teaching hospitals is recruiting an academic Hematopathologist with a requirement of training/expertise in Transfusion Medicine. Additional training/expertise in tissue typing (HLA) would be considered an asset.

We are a very collegial department, with a strong culture of scholarship. The expectation of the successful appointee will be to oversee the operation of the Transfusion Medicine Laboratory, as well as the HLA laboratory, if sufficient expertise in this area. We are part of an academic health sciences centre with a full Hematology/Oncology service, an active autologous stem cell transplant program, cardiac surgery, regional trauma centre, Level 3 NICU and renal transplant program. Participation in routine hematopathology service including blood film, bone marrow, hemoglobinopathy, flow cytometry and hemostasis sign out is also expected.

Candidates must be eligible for medical licensure with the college of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario and must hold postgraduate qualifications in Hematological Pathology. Preference will be given to applicants who hold certification from the Royal College of Physicians & Surgeons of Canada or the American Board of Medical Specialties. Candidates must demonstrate strong potential and/or experience for innovative and scholarly research as well as provide evidence of an ability to work in an interdisciplinary, collaborative environment. Demonstration of a strong potential for teaching contributions in the Department's undergraduate, graduate and postgraduate training programs will also be expected. Appointment will be at an academic rank commensurate with experience.

Evaluation of applications will begin immediately and will continue until the position is filled.
